Why We Do What We Do by Fred Kirchenwitz, Head of Elders

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia! Thought I would put that joyous Easter greeting out there seeing as it's right around the corner. The last article I wrote for the Parish Pulse was purely informational, while this one, I am hoping, will be more educational.

The Strategic Planning committee asked the Board of Elders to address certain topics from the congregational survey that was collected. Among them are having the youth more involved in the worship service, having lay members read, offering a contemporary service, and having a quarterly speaker to give pastor a break. I can't really address all those points in this article, but if you are interested, I would gladly discuss it with you individually or at our monthly Elders meetings. My goal in this letter is to address the role of women in the worship service, specifically if they should serve as Elders or serve Communion.

Good Shepherd's polity (operational and governance structure) is explained in our constitution and bylaws. These bylaws state that the congregation acknowledges and accepts all the books of the Old and New Testament as the revealed Word of God, verbally inspired and as the only rule of faith and life. We also abide in the confessional writings of the Lutheran Church which are as follows: The Book of Concord, the 3 Creeds, the unaltered Augsburg confession, Apology of the Augsburg confession, Smalcald articles, Luther's Small and Large Catechism, and the Formula of Concord. I'm sure you have these all memorized, as I do......haha, but these are the writings we Believe, Teach and Confess.

Good Shepherd also belongs to the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, so we also follow their polity, which states in regards to women in congregational offices:

- 1. Women may not serve in the office of the pastor nor exercise any of it's distinctive functions.
- 2. Women may serve in humanely established offices in the church as long as the functions of these offices do not make them eligible to carry out official functions that would involve public accountability for the function of the pastoral office.

To summarize the second point: Lay assistance in the distribution of the elements in the celebration of Holy Communion, in order to avoid confusion regarding the office of the public ministry and to avoid giving offense to the church, should be limited to lay men.

Are you all still with me? Nobody dozed off? Excellent! I would like to say that this is a succinct way of explaining why men are Elders. Oops, too late for that! I would like to emphasize that this is all biblically based from Ephesians 5: 22-32, 1 Peter 3:1-6, and Genesis 1:26-28. I encourage you to read these passages, and if you can, to do it in a Lutheran Study Bible. I know a lot of what I've written sounds like "Law", but if you read the Study Bible (which puts it more profoundly than I ever could, you'll realize that it's based in "Gospel").

Have you heard about qualified charitable distributions (QCDs)?

When planning your IRA withdrawal strategy, you may want to consider making charitable donations through a QCD. A QCD is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA custodian, payable to a qualified charity. QCDs can be counted toward satisfying your required minimum distributions (RMDs) for the year, as long as certain rules are met.

In addition to the benefits of giving to charity, a QCD excludes the amount donated from taxable income, which is unlike regular withdrawals from an IRA. Keeping your taxable income lower may reduce the impact to certain tax credits and deductions, including Social Security and Medicare.

Also, QCDs don't require that you itemize, which due to the recent tax law changes, means you may decide to take advantage of the higher standard deduction, but still use a QCD for charitable giving.

Can I make a QCD? - While many IRAs are eligible for QCDs—Traditional, Rollover, Inherited, SEP (inactive plans only), and SIMPLE (inactive plans only)*—there are requirements:

- You must be 70½ or older to be eligible to make a QCD.
- QCDs are limited to the amount that would otherwise be taxed as ordinary income. This excludes non-deductible contributions.
- The maximum annual amount that can qualify for a QCD is \$100,000. This applies to the sum of QCDs made to one or more charities in a calendar year. (If, however, you file taxes jointly, your spouse can also make a QCD from his or her own IRA within the same tax year for up to \$100,000.)
- For a QCD to count towards your current year's RMD, the funds must come out of your IRA by your RMD deadline, generally December 31.
- Contributing to an IRA may result in a reduction of the QCD amount you can deduct. (The aggregate amount of deductible IRA contributions you make to your IRA after you turn 70 1/2 will reduce the amount of the QCD that is not includible in your gross income.)

Any amount donated above your RMD does not count toward satisfying a future year's RMD. Funds distributed directly to you, the IRA owner, and which you then give to charity do not qualify as a QCD.

Under certain circumstances, a QCD may be made from a Roth IRA. Roth IRAs are not subject to RMDs during your lifetime, and distributions are generally tax-free. Consult a tax advisor to determine if making a QCD from a Roth is appropriate for your situation.

What kind of charities qualify? - The charity must be a 501(c)(3) organization, eligible to receive tax-deductible contributions.

Tax reporting - A QCD is reported as a normal distribution on IRS Form 1099-R for any non-Inherited IRAs. For Inherited IRAs or Inherited Roth IRAs, the QCD will be reported as a death distribution. Itemization is not required to make a QCD. While the QCD amount is not taxed, you may not then claim the distribution as a charitable tax deduction.

A QCD is not subject to withholding. State tax rules may vary, so for guidance, consult a tax advisor.

When making a QCD, you must receive the same type of acknowledgement of the donation that you would need to claim a deduction for a charitable contribution. A tax advisor can help you determine if both your IRA and charity qualify for QCDs.

2023 Pastors Report (Year end for 2022)

You always hear me refer to your church, Good Shepherd, as "your church" which it is, but never more so than this coming year. We have paid off our debt! Good Shepherd is now no longer owned by a bank but truly owned by its members. "Your church" has never been more applicable. Of course, ultimately it's Christ's Church...The Lord of lords has put us in this position to seek to do His will here at Good Shepherd and beyond, so...now what?

That's the question we're seeking to answer in our strategic development meetings, elders meetings, council meetings, etc. From some in-house improvements (sound/light/garden walk path, basement re-vamp) to looking at hiring staff (youth, assistant pastor, etc.) to expounding our mission outreach to Oshkosh and beyond...what an exciting time to be a part of God's movement at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church!

Last year was strong and stable for Good Shepherd. We gained some strength in numbers (and hopefully in faithfulness). We lost some members who moved out of the area or were called to their eternal home. Some members found a better fit for them for worship elsewhere and that's ok too.

Sunday mornings at Good Shepherd are typically vibrant with people from all age groups worshipping and fellowshipping together. A handful of new groups have formed over the last year. Thank you to the newly formed "Blessing Brigade" which sends out cards to people and helps people in the event of a need. I'm excited to see new relationships being forged and people growing in their faith in Christ. God is being glorified in many and various ways at your church. I'm very confident that the momentum we carry from 2022 will push us up hill in 2023 and it's going to be another great year here in Oshkosh.

Thank you for everything...Doing things without being asked, those who clean and take care of church, helping with different events and serving on different committees, accomplishing tasks, welcoming new people, teaching and mentoring our children and young adults, sharing musical skills, opening up your pockets to help pay the bills and support Good Shepherd's missions, tech help, Craft Fair help, landscaping/snow removal/lawn cutting, the support you give me and my family. We're so blessed to be here.

We have an absolutely incredible Board of Elders and Church Council that dedicates their time and talents to Good Shepherd and for that we are certainly blessed. We have an absolutely incredible musical staff and Sunday School staff that also dedicates their time and talents to teach our kids and enhance our worship experience at Good Shepherd as well. Our Fellowship committee continues to bring people together for Christian fellowship...as well as implementing a prayer partner/mentor program for our confirmands. Our relatively newly formed Lutheran Woman's Missionary League (LWML) at Good Shepherd is moving forward and has also met their 2022 goal with the collection of our mites...helping change the world with Christ's message and their mighty-mites...Thanks you, LWML!We have continued to develop a "Board of Education" in the hopes of standardizing and bettering our current confirmation practices and making sure our children know the basic concepts of the faith and how it applies to their lives. We are also blessed with in incredible office staff (of one) and a formative group of volunteers that keeps things rolling and moving forward. Thank you all!

Good Shepherd is stable. On average, we worshipped 220 people/week in 2022. This is just under 50% of our membership, but is not counting the 150 views/week via Facebook/Website. For comparison, 2021 average was 186. Let's look at some stats beginning with Official Acts (from 2022)

Stewardship 2022 Year in Review: Daniel Weiss

Our mortgage is at \$0. Our biggest news from 2022 is that we paid off our mortgage. This is the result of many years of prayer, sacrifice, and faithful giving by Good Shepherd members. Those that were here at the time may recall that less than 10 years ago, Good Shepherd was financially hurting to the point of modifying our loan to an interest-only mortgage. This is usually the death-knell for churches. By God's grace and many faithful members, we were able to work toward financial freedom in December. Don't neglect to attend our mortgage burning service and celebration on February 18. This is a BIG DEAL!

Our volunteers were magnificent. One reason we were able to pay down the church debt like we did is that so many individuals stepped in to care for our congregation's many needs. We have saved tens of thousands of dollars over the years because of volunteers mowing our lawns, shoveling our sidewalks, doing routine maintenance, and for many years, cleaning the church each week. We also earn a significant amount through the SCRIP program. Thanks are due to Jeff and Linda Everson for running the program and for the many members who use it. We are also grateful for our worship assistants, such as Altar Guild, ushers, and elders. Our services flow so well because of the many people working in front and behind the scenes. Then there are the dedicated Sunday School and confirmation teachers. Thank you for caring for our youth so well. This year also saw David and Sharon Leinweber and many others beautify the church grounds and assist with the sign transition. Finally, our church is governed by the members themselves through the volunteers who sit on the Church Council. These dedicated volunteers are working hard each month to manage the church's business and are often underappreciated. Thanks to all that serve in this capacity and those volunteers working on the various boards.

Strategic planning was launched. In anticipation of the mortgage retirement, the Council invited the congregation for strategic projects/ideas for consideration as we chart out the next few years of ministry. Late in the year, we identified several projects that were of greatest need or opportunity and elevated these to our strategic planning project list. The congregation approved monies to go into the strategic planning fund in 2023 to help us get these things done. The first projects include improving the lighting and sound in the sanctuary and updating the fellowship hall in the basement to be more inviting. Nicole Virgen and a host of volunteers also updated our Sunday school rooms. Thanks for your great work!

In writing this yearend report, I looked to our constitution to see again what the exact duties of an Elder are, and to compare them with what I believe as a group we have accomplished or fallen short of. We would like to thank them for their dedication and commitment to Good Shepherd! In their place, Jacob Schroeder and Dave Eichhorn have stepped up. They may have big shoes to fill, but they have already proved to be great additions and assets to the board.

2022 Board of Youth Year End Report - Matt & Julie Toll

Much of 2022 centered around the Youth Gathering that was held in Houston during the month of July. Early in the year we had our big pizza sale in which we made and sold almost 300 pizzas to help raise funds for the Gathering. During the early months of the year we also maintained our weekly hangouts on Wednesday nights in which we averaged 6 teens in attendance each week. From there on it was lots and lots of planning, filling in all the blanks to get all the details in order for the Youth Gathering. As July rolled around, 8 teens and 2 chaperones were ready to embark on the Gathering adventure. The Gathering was a great experience for us all to lean into God's Word, being reminded of His promises and faithfulness, and to encourage and support one another in the struggles and trials we face in life. <u>Trustee's 2022 Year End Report</u> - Craig Dreger

We coasted thru 2022 without any budget busting maintenance catastrophes or unexpected major expenses. Several large (expensive) budgeted projects were completed to good effect. One of these was the resealing and striping of the parking lot, this is a reoccurring expense every three years, the other large expense was the replacement of the choir room floor with an epoxy coating, this should last us many years to come.

Another large project accomplished in 2022 was replacement of the lighted sign in front of the church, this project was off budget as it was completely funded by designated special donations. The new sign has several advancements over the old sign. The new sign offers increased visibility to traffic passing by on Ninth Avenue, it allows us to stay up to date on service times, highlight special services such as Advent and Lent or Holy Week service times, and any other special messages such as mission of the month or upcoming events i.e. Craft Fair or VBS.

Windows in the sanctuary were noted last year as needing attention, several were fixed with some simple repairs, and one remains that needs the opener crank replaced which is somewhat involved and expensive to repair, this will be addressed when the weather warms up this spring.

A "Ring doorbell" was added for increased security for staff and others using the facility in off hours.

We should expect repair expenses will continue to be larger in the future than they have been in past years given the age of our building and infrastructure. A myriad of mundane projects, unclogging drains, redirecting down spouts, fixing faucets & toilets while not expensive to repair they do consume a fair amount of time & effort in the course of the year. These types of issues are not predictable and never ending, not tragedies just inconveniences.

With winter on us the parking lot snow removal contract is taken care of using the contractor from previous years. Sidewalk snow removal is accomplished by volunteers; there is a signup sheet in the narthex. As always there is an ongoing need for volunteers for snow blowing and lawn care.

Volunteers are the lifeblood of a functioning church without them our earthly life would be much coarser. We enjoy the services of many good volunteers but we can always use more. Going forward in 2023 we have a long list of expensive "want to have" projects i.e. repainting the worship area. We will have to wait and see how well the budget will stand up to some of these projects and prioritize them as we get into the New Year.

Strategic Planning Team Spring Update by Daniel Weiss, Head of Stewardship

Last Fall, the Church Council surveyed the congregation to learn more about the kinds of ministry we should be exploring as we neared the full payment of our mortgage. You submitted 42 ideas that we examined, categorized, and directed to various boards to consider. At the end of the 1st quarter of 2023, we have much progress to report. I hope you will take a few moments to review the work of our Strategic Planning Team and pray about the areas where we still need guidance and support.

Successes

(Congregational ideas that have been completed or are being implemented)

• Idea 1: Develop a Master Plan for Staffing/Add a second Pastor/Youth Director.

Action: We have formed a Staffing Study Group (SSG) to explore the needs of the congregation. This team will begin its work in earnest after Easter. Look for a congregational survey in June that will help us learn more about our staffing needs.

• Idea 2: Improve lighting and sound system/paint the sanctuary.

Action: We have formed a Sanctuary Improvement Team (SIT) headed by Chad Smith. This team is soliciting estimates of various costs and will present findings to the full Church Council for review and approval.

• Idea 3: Grow Good Shepherd's exposure in the community and leverage technology.

Action: In 2022, we added the digital sign, have adopted local missions, and continue livestreaming our services. If you have other ideas to increase our exposure to our community, please share them with President Chad Smith smithck2@gmail.com or Stewardship Chair Daniel Weiss dweiss@sexualintegrityleaders.com

• Idea 4: Provide more purpose driven Bible studies.

Action: The Education Board is seeking small-group leaders and Bible study ideas from congregation. Please share specific ideas with Jen Charles jcharles 987@yahoo.com.

• Idea 5: Provide young adult Bible studies.

Action: Katie Rodig is teaching high school youth on Sundays with an informal question and discussion format that is working very well.

• Idea 6: Evaluate the new confirmation format for success or problems.

Action: The Confirmation Evaluation Committee reports significant improvement among this year's confirmands. Year 3 students are vastly more prepared than they were in recent years. Year 2 students are grasping concepts and enjoying learning. Year 1 students have embraced the more informal style of learning as they grow familiar with basic Bible, church, and theological knowledge. Additionally, the Fellowship Board has arranged Prayer Partners for each confirmand, further strengthening their bond with the congregation. • Idea 7: Have more congregational dinners, game nights, etc.

Action: Two game nights were held in March and were well received. Attendees reported that the format allowed members to get to know others outside of their familiar groups. Congregational meals during Lent and Advent provide other opportunities for fellowship.

• Idea 8: Continue Mission of the Month

Action: The Evangelism Board is continuing this great idea.

• Idea 9: Update Sunday School rooms.

Action: Rooms were painted in late 2022. Other updates are being considered. Please share ideas with Nicole Vergin nikole.vergin@gmail.com. (Continued)

• Idea 10: Develop an annual every member visitation program.

Action: This is already being offered to those interested through the Elders outreach. The Elders will make every effort to connect with and offer a visitation to members during their normal contacts. If you desire a pastoral or elder visit, please contact the church office to set it up.

• Idea 11: Provide more opportunities for women to assist in services. (Communion, Elders).

Action: The Elders plan to educate the congregation (with new members coming from many denominations) on LCMS Synodical practice and Scriptural reasons for male pastorate and elders. Head Elder Fred Kirchenwitz also addressed some of these topics in his article in this issue tof the Parish Pulse. If you have further questions, please contact Pastor Koepsell or your assigned elder.

• Idea 12: Only have one service on Sundays and have more time for fellowship.

Action: Thankfully, church growth over recent years prevents us from moving to one service outside of summer months. We are open to suggestions about improving fellowship options in summer and between services. Please contact Sharon Leinweber sharon.leinweber@yahoo.com with ideas.

• Idea 13: Have regular times of prayer outside of normal worship services.

Action: The Stewardship Board will explore this in the second half of 2023.

• Idea 14: Offer training on understanding and using our spiritual gifts

Action: The Boards of Education and Stewardship will work with Pastor Koepsell and the Elder Board to identify and procure Bible studies that cover this topic. If you have ideas about curriculum or resources, please contact Daniel Weiss dweiss@sexualintegrityleaders.com.

• Idea 15: Host a guest Pastor once a quarter

Action: The Board of Elders and Pastor Koepsell have secured preaching commitments in 2023 from South-Wisconsin District President John Wille and Mission Executive Nathan Meador.

• Idea 16: Provide Preschool care at Good Shepherd.

Action: The Strategic Planning Team identified two existing preschools within and near Oshkosh. Trinity Lutheran on the east side of town and Grace Lutheran in Omro both offer this service currently and both are struggling to cover the costs. We recommend the congregation support these two ministries before launching our own. The Council is exploring allocating mission monies to these preschools in the next budget.

• Idea 17: Review church constitution and bylaws for any needed updates

Action: The Council determined that the last time our Constitution and Bylaws were amended was 2001. Council is currently reviewing our governing documents and will bring suggestions for further study to the May Council meeting.

<u>Current Needs</u>

(Congregational ideas that need support and/or leadership)

• Idea 1: Grow the Blessing Brigade.

Action: In the past few years, Good Shepherd members have grown increasingly invested in the spiritual, emotional, and physical well-being of the congregation. From arranging meals, to praying for confirmands, to sending notes of encouragement, we are trying to make sure every member at Good Shepherd feels known, loved, and valued. Our Blessing Brigade is spearheading this effort, but we could use more members. 




